From the Sheriff's Desk

Another holiday season has drawn to a close, and a new year has begun. We have so much to be grateful for in this wonderful community. I count the Justice Coalition and the *Victim's Advocate* among those blessings because of the compassion they have for those who have suffered a loss and been the victim of crime and the service they provide through their advocacy of law enforcement.

This is a very busy time for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office because our Planning and Research Unit will spend much of January studying the past year's crime statistics and beginning the process of preparing a report for the federal government called the Uniform Crime Report (UCR).

The UCR Program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of more than 17,000 city, university and college, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes brought to their attention. During 2004, law enforcement agencies active in the UCR Program represented 94.2 percent of the total population.

Reliable Criminal Statistics

Since 1930, the FBI has administered the UCR Program and issued periodic assessments of the nature and type of crime in the nation. The program's primary objective is to generate a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management."

In a manner of speaking, the UCR Program "levels the playing field" so cities and metropolitan areas can look at other cities and make comparisons based on the same criteria for everyone. Because it is important that everything we report is accurate, we have analysts who spend all year long making sure that all reported crime is properly categorized for this important report. The Planning and Research Unit is the custodian of the "official statistics" using these standard definitions of the FBI.

I am proud of the commanding knowledge and expertise members of our

UNSOLVED MURDERS. Month after month we publish a full page of pictures, and almost every month we add a new face.

Another life needlessly snuffed out by someone with no regard for human life. Another family shattered by grief. Parents mourning the loss of a son or daughter. Children who will grow up without the guidance of a loving parent.

Murderers are not around to witness the endless devastation they wreak on innocent victims. They don't see – or care about – tears brimming, just waiting to pour from eyes already red from weeping. They don't witness marital conflict between spouses as each tries to deal with his/her own loss in different ways. They have no concept of what it's like for grandparents, even great-grandparents, long after they should be retired and enjoying their golden years, to assume the awesome

responsibility of rearing little ones orphaned by a low-life degenerate with no compunction for his awful deed.

Murders occur for any number of reasons – during the commission of a crime, in a moment of anger (crime of passion), as a premeditated act to remove someone from the murderer's life – all committed by a person who lives with the knowledge of what he or she did.

And most people, at one time or another, for one reason or another, have a compulsion to talk about their actions to a friend, co-worker, cellmate, relative – maybe just an acquaintance.

Have YOU heard someone mention his/her involvement in a murder? Were YOU involved with this person? Do YOU know someone who could shed some light – any bit of information at all – that might lead to closure of one of these cases?
